Despite the fact that the handwriting is quite neat, I was unable to decipher it all or to figure out exactly what Isaacher did with the leather he measured [the Hoopes history says he was a bookkeeper]. Anyone know?

Also sent by Ron was this ad for the Hoops Inn in Devon, England. Has anyone been there or seen the place? Does anyone know how the namesakes relate to our branch of the family?

Sent by Richard K. Hoopes, No. 11000, of West Chester, PA - A note to remind us that "according to info on p. 41 of Vol I, this Oct. 5 will be [was] the 300th anniversary of the deeding of Brooznoll Farm to Daniel Hoopes."

Thanks to the many who sent material regarding the Barclay Hoopes family farm. One of the articles is copied on the back of page 3. Another showed a picture of Barclay greeting Agriculture Secretary Samuel E. Hayes, Jr., who remarked, "When you think of America, you think of Chester County. The article says that the Hoopes family will give daily hay-rides through Halloween in an effort to improve agricultural understanding.

## Patterns from early industries on display

Some are shown as they were used in factories. Others have been made into art...

Edgar Lawrence, a retired dentist, recently hauled several crate-loads of heavy wood objects to the Chester County Historical Society here.

As historical artifacts, inherited by his wife, Lawrence's pieces had a rightful place at the society. But they are not typical family heirlooms. They are foundry patterns, remnants of the industrial age that were used to make molds for machine parts.

...Lawrence's patterns came from Hoopes, Brother and Darlington, an early West Chester wheel-works, and were used to make replacements for broken parts.

In Chester County, Lawrence is one of the few people who have managed to salvage these once-essential industrial forms. He had access to hundreds of them, because he and his wife, Betsy, briefly took over Hoopes, her family's firm, in the early 1970s. The company, founded in 1866, was one of the last major producers of wooden wheels in the nation when it closed in 1973.

...While many patterns are shown for their complex craftsmanship, the exhibit is designed to be informative about early industries as well. There are captioned photographs of workmen manning machines at Hoopes, which once had a factory that employed more than 200 and occupied two full blocks from Market Street south to Barnard.
